WIT 2019 Spotlights - Stories of Impact



Sandy Ali

Sandy was just a child in elementary school in Iraq when terrorists entered her school and killed the principal in front of her eyes. The devastation would leave its mark for years to come, many filled with their own similar trials. Ultimately, her family had to flee the country.

Sandy left her home with her family to start a new life in Syria. She started school and began learning about Syrian culture, immediately falling in love with the country. For the first time in her life, she felt loved. Still, it was just a stepping- stone. Her family had started filling out the paperwork to emigrate to the United States, though it would take several years before the process finalized. In that time, conflict reared its head once more. 6

years after her family moved to Syria, the war began. This time, though, fate had better plans. With serendipitous timing, Sandy's family was finally able to move to the United States just as Syria entered that period of struggle. Once more they left their home, this time with eyes set on the United States. After reaching the States, Sandy started from scratch learning an entirely new culture, new customs, and a language she had never heard. But the obstacles didn't matter. When you spend each day since childhood in fear that you might be killed, it puts things into perspective. She perfected English, excelled in high school, and went on to pursue her degree at Georgia Gwinnett College.

Life was finally simpler--easier. But Sandy wanted more. She joined the Women In Technology program at her school and found a purpose--a passion--in helping her peers succeed in their goals. Through these experiences and opportunities from Penny Collins (then Global Chief Technology Control Officer of First Data) and Mike Manos (Global Chief Technology Officer of First Data), Sandy found an opportunity to be a First Data intern, and she left as a Fiserv intern. It was an opportunity that she is still thankful for. According to Sandy, "Women In Technology is not just an organization it is a movement."

Today Sandy is employed by Apple and is excited about her future ahead. Sandy values her membership in WIT and continues to volunteer as the WIT Project Manager for WIT Connect.

Single Mothers Education Program with Supportive Services



WIT has furthered their impact and reach by announcing its new Single Mothers Education Program with Supportive Services. This program serves 40 underserved single mothers annually by offering a Cyber Security Certificate course at Emory University at no cost to them. Cyber Security is one of the fastest growing fields in technology with an astounding workforce gap and shortage of talent. By completing the 12-week certificate course, these single mothers have the opportunity to earn \$50,000+ per year immediately upon completion of the program, improving the quality of their lives and the lives of their children.

Support services provided at no charge for

participants: Childcare (WIT Partner - Sheltering Arms); Transportation (WIT Partner - Atlanta Regional Commission and Uber); Laptops provided (WIT Partner - RNDC); Lunch provided (WIT Partner - Rollins Corporation); Pathway and professional coaching (WIT Partner - Thrive Her); Financial and nutritional literacy coaching (WIT Partner - Warrick Dunn Charities); Corporate etiquette and norms classes (Wright Now Solutions); Free access to monthly WIT Forums for 2 years (networking and educational monthly breakfast event), and job placement services after completion of the course (WIT Job Placement Partner- HUNTER Technical).






WIT COMMUNITY
